I was born on June 14, 1993 in Joliet, IL. My parents, Laura Sida and Ramon Sida Jr, are both Mexican. My siblings are Karen Sida, Brenda Sida and Ricardo Sida, all of whom were born in Joliet. I am the oldest. I lived in Cuauhtémoc, Chihuahua, México up until I was 19 years old. During my Summer breaks, I would usually come to the States to visit my father's family. His parents and four brothers live in the Joliet area. This is why I eventually ended up studying for this great diocese.

My family has always been very active in the Church. I am a good Christian today because of the great Christian witness my parents gave my siblings and me. When I was preparing for my Confirmation, I attended a retreat in which I truly came to know the Lord and His great love for me. However, I was afraid to express my interest in the priesthood, so I tried to ignore the call for some time.

In addition, I started teaching RE after my confirmation to first graders and even started a church choir! During this retreat I really felt the Lord calling me to follow him more closely and to give up my life for Him. It was as a consequence that I entered seminary after my Sophomore year of high school. Quite young! This decision has marked my life and continues to do so.

At the same time, I always had a curiosity about what it would be like to be a seminarian and priest in the United States. My experience in the high school seminary in Juarez was very positive and helped me to learn many things about myself. But after I graduated from high school, I felt the Lord calling me to be a missionary and to come to the States.

In the summer of 2011, while visiting my family in Joliet, I met Fr. Burke Masters. He talked to me about the great need for bilingual priests in the diocese, people in need to hear the Gospel in their own language! He told me that the Hispanic community was growing very rapidly, and that the diocese could use some help with Spanish-speaking priests.

My time in formation has been a true blessing in my life. God has put so many wonderful people, parishioners, and experiences in my life that have helped me grow in

my vocation and in being more confident. For instance, during Fall semester my senior year of college, I had the opportunity to study in Rome, the "Eternal City." It was a grace-filled experience that strengthened my faith as well as my desire to answer God's call. In addition, a group of seminarians and I were blessed to serve Mass for Pope Francis on Christmas Eve at St. Peters Basilica!

On March 30<sup>th</sup>, 2019, I was ordained a deacon along with six of my classmates. Every day in the ministry has been a blessing and I feel truly happy and fulfilled answering to God's call in this particular vocation. From baptizing babies to blessing people after Mass, I love every everything about it! This summer I was assigned to St. Mary Immaculate Parish. Additionally, I attended classes at Gallaudet University to continue preparing to serve our beautiful deaf community in our diocese.
